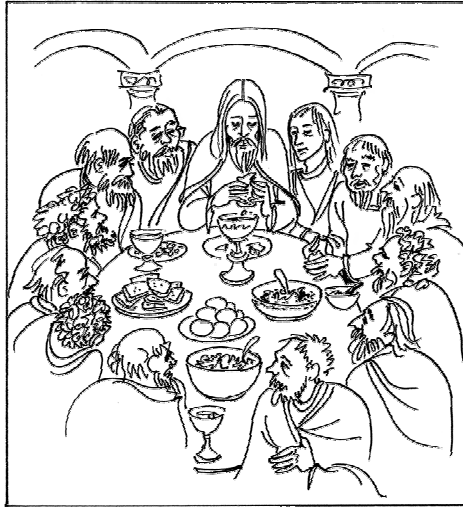

From the Vicar

Dear Reader,

I always love this time of year with the change in the weather to see some warmer sunshine, the spring flowers beginning to poke their heads through the ground, the birds singing again (so it seems) and the lighter mornings and evenings.

After the dreary days of winter the change is uplifting, a 'new beginning' for a new year. Everyone's attitude seems to brighten, even though, from an 'objective' viewpoint, nothing has really changed.

Actually, there's a sense in which Easter is a bit like that. After the horrific and unjust death of Jesus on Good Friday, Easter Day dawns with a new hope for the world as Jesus is risen, and in so doing breaks forever the hold of death. No longer can the grave keep its victims. No longer is death the last word. No! Now life has the final say.

At one level, nothing has changed apparently changed. People still die. People still do some horrendous things to one another.

And yet at a more foundational level everything is different. Now there is no doubt that we are loved and accepted by God. Now there is the opportunity for life everlasting. Now we have nothing to fear, for ultimately we are destined for life in all its fullness, and not the grave.

And that means we can live in a very different way. We don't have to hoard possessions as though they might keep death at bay. We don't have to rise above those around us, for who can better being a child of the king of kings?

Rather, recognising our status as loved by God means that we are set free to serve our brothers and sisters. Free to ignore the taunts of the world around that fears those who don't live by its rules. Free, in short, to enjoy life to the full.

If being set free from the insecurity that this world offers, being set free from the pressures of conforming to the expectation of others, or being set free from the fear of ultimate loneliness appeals, then why not come along to church this Easter, and discover that freedom for yourself?

God longs to breath his new life into all his children, and he wants to breathe that freedom into you! Will you let him?

Freedom is a funny thing, though. We so often think it means that we can choose to do exactly what we want. But that is only unrestraint.

True freedom comes from working within strict boundaries.

Don't believe me? Think what freedom the opportunity to drive whichever side of the road you liked would bring ... total chaos! Sticking to your side of the road allows us all to travel safely, free from fear!

So true freedom in life means listening to the heartbeat of God and adjusting your life accordingly.

If we're not willing to listen for that heartbeat, then we'll only be chasing shadows, the illusion of freedom rather than the real thing.

Taking space to listen for that deep rhythm of life is vital, and perhaps especially vital in the frantic lives we so often lead. Time spent in church can often be the only time in a busy week when you make that time to be still and attune yourself to the divine.

So what is it like when week after week that space is taken up by leading those services? Of course, there's prayer and time daily, but somehow when it's your 'job', the dynamic is slightly different.

That's one of the reasons the church suggests that clergy take a sabbatical, and the reason I'm taking mine, starting on April 27th.

The first thing I'll be doing is walking the Pennine Way, taking 15 days to complete (if all goes well!!) Being on my own is usually the way I am able to listen most clearly to God, and in the countryside, away from people, that process for me seems more 'open'.

After that, I will be visiting different churches around the country, focussing on those 'fresh expressions' of church that are not the usual Sunday style that we are used. Churches that often are focussed around a particular interest or network of friendships. As well as getting lots of ideas (watch out!) I will be looking especially at the support and training needed for those leading such ventures as they try and reach out practically to find new culturally relevant ways of being church in today's cultures.

Finally, I will probably walk the Coast to Coast path—just because it's there!

I return officially to work on 27th July, hopefully renewed and reinvigorated, and with a clear sense of where God is leading us in the immediate future.

During the time I'm away, various people will be helping with the services, and in particular, Rev. Tina Turner will be providing a great deal of support. It will be great to welcome her back to Christ Church and St. Augustine's, and I know you will welcome her warmly.

Pray now for Zimbabwe

31 March marked the first anniversary of the disputed elections in Zimbabwe, the results of which Mr Robert Mugabe has since flagrantly disregarded. Now the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have called for prayer for Zimbabwe. They note “with horror” the “appalling difficulties” of the people under the current regime. “We give thanks to God for the faithful witness of the Christians of Zimbabwe during this time of pain and suffering, especially those who are being denied access to their churches. We wish to assure them of our love, support and prayers as they face gross violation of human rights, hunger and loss of life as well as the scourge of a cholera epidemic, all due directly to the deteriorating socio-political and economic situation in Zimbabwe.”

Time was spent discussing where we are at and where we still need to go. If you would like to know more please ask John for a copy of the Action Plan.

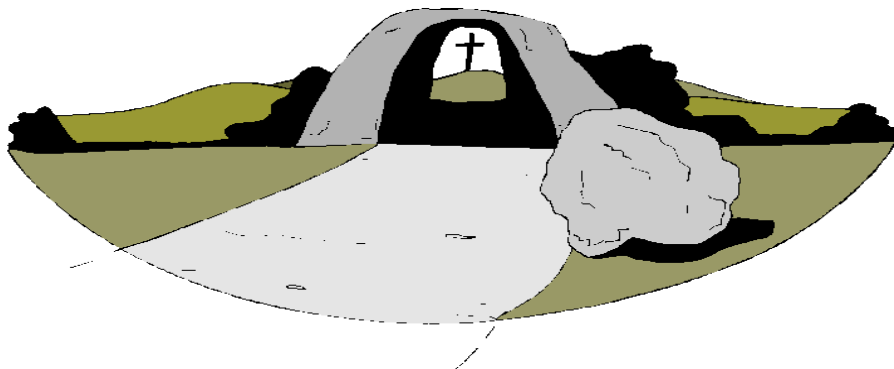
John will soon be going on his Sabbatical and he is busy making sure that all the necessary arrangements for his cover are in place. Details will follow in due course.

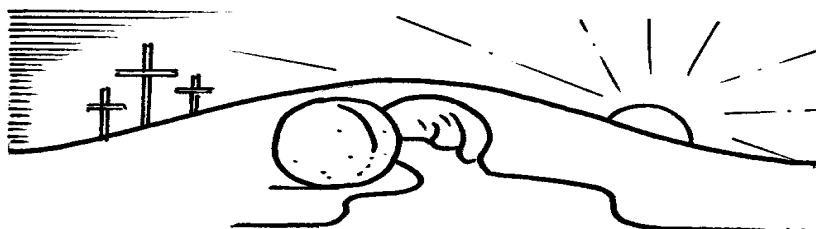

Training v Trying

Most of us would like to more aware of Jesus' presence in our lives on a daily basis. However, we can often find ourselves saying, *'if this is going to happen, I will have to try harder – to pray, listen to God, read the Bible etc'*. However, if God really wants us to know this life, he wouldn't have suggested it if it wasn't possible.

Paul makes the important distinction between *training* and *trying* in the Christian life:

'Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever'. (1 Corinthians 9:24,25)



Notice what he says: runners must go into strict training if they are to win the race. As we know, it would be foolish to enter a marathon without training. We wouldn't complete the course despite trying hard! However, with training we could attempt a marathon if we really wanted to. We would have to eat differently and exercise, but with the right coaching we could complete the race. The same principles apply to the Christian life: God wants us to train spiritually if we are to live the life he wants for us.

Training is an indispensable ingredient for pursuing spiritual transformation. As Dallas Willard has pointed out, *'to train means to arrange my life around activities I can do that will enable me, over time, to do what I cannot do by direct effort alone'*. Generally, we *overestimate* what we can do by trying and *underestimate* what we can do by training. As Paul writes to Timothy, *'train yourself to be godly'* (1 Timothy 4:7).

How does this work out in practice? It means engaging in spiritual practices in order to use them to train us to be more like Jesus. For example, as we learn to listen more to people, we will listen to God more effectively.

Set the task of training yourself to listen to others, resisting the urge to jump in and speak before they have finished what they want to say. Perhaps using the phrase *'tell me more'* can help you. Expect to see the changes in you as a result!
