# From the Vicar

## Gardening Lessons?

Dear Reader,

Why is it that when the good weather comes and it would be nice to sit out in the garden and enjoy the sunshine, and the peace and quiet, all you can hear is the sound of the grass growing at such a rate that if you sit there for any length of time you're likely to end up in a wilderness surrounded by prowling lions?

Instead of being able to enjoy the garden, it's time to get the lawnmower out and try and get on top of things before they get totally out of hand. Indeed, if you leave it too late, then the job gets even harder, and takes ten times longer as after every five seconds you have to empty the grass collector.

Nothing seems to stay the same. It doesn't seem like two minutes since it was last cut, and it needs doing again!

Mind you, I don't suppose we would really want it any other way, would we? Imagine a world where the grass didn't grow... A world where when the leaves dropped off the trees they didn't grow again, where, when the flowers were flattened by the rain stayed flattened, where because things always stayed the same, there were no lambs frolicking around the fields in spring time.

No, change is an essential part of the world we live in. We may regret some of the changes we see – not all change is for the good – but we can't really complain at change in itself.

The real question is whether the change is inevitable, and if not, whether it's good or bad. If it's inevitable, then we need to learn to accept the way God has made the world. The growing of grass falls into this category. We can't stop it, and trying to do so is a waste of time.

Death also falls into this category. People live, grow and die – it's part of what makes up life. Somehow, if we try and hold on to life at all costs – to deny death – then the quality of that life is diminished.

Look at Jesus. He faced death openly (even though he struggled with the means of it!) and so his life was lived to the full.

It's the same with us. Only to the extent that we face the reality of our approaching death can we truly live life in all its fullness.

Death is a change we cannot prevent. But we can decide whether we face it in a good or a bad way. And as usual, what we find is true in life in general we find is true in church life. Change is inevitable. We live in a world of changes, where people's expectations are different now from even 20 years ago; where the pressures of everyday living are very different. No doubt we could all list a hundred ways in which things have changed since we were a child.

In particular for us as a church, there are several things that have changed recently, and we need not to fight the change, but work out how to respond appropriately.

Firstly, and this is across the country, not just locally, there is a shortage of priests and also the money to pay for them. Of course in an ideal world, we could have one priest per parish – a priest who spent all their time visiting their parishioners (along with spending hours in prayer, preparing wonderful sermons, being involved in the life of the community, helping the schools...)

This, perhaps, is one of the reasons why we have now begun formal links with St. Augustine's. But even if the pressures that have brought this into being may be negative, we can respond positively!

This is an exciting time, and the developing links provide great potential for some wonderful work. The people of St. Augustine's have some skills and experiences that we can benefit from at Christ Church, and vice versa. Their nationally recognised and respected work among refugees and asylum seekers is a case in point.

Of course, there will have to be changes. We've seen a change in our early service time (from 8.30am to 8.00am) – they've seen a big change from 11.00am to 9.15am! We'll have to continue to monitor things and see whether more changes are needed.

But perhaps the greatest change is not in the structures but in people's attitudes. In the midst of a fast-changing world, it's easy to look for something – and perhaps especially the church – to find some kind of stability. But the truth is that that stability is not found in the outward forms of church we recognise, but in the constant love of the God we worship.

Handled rightly, change sends us back to the source of stability – God himself – and when he's involved, nothing is impossible, and everything can be transformed into something beautiful.

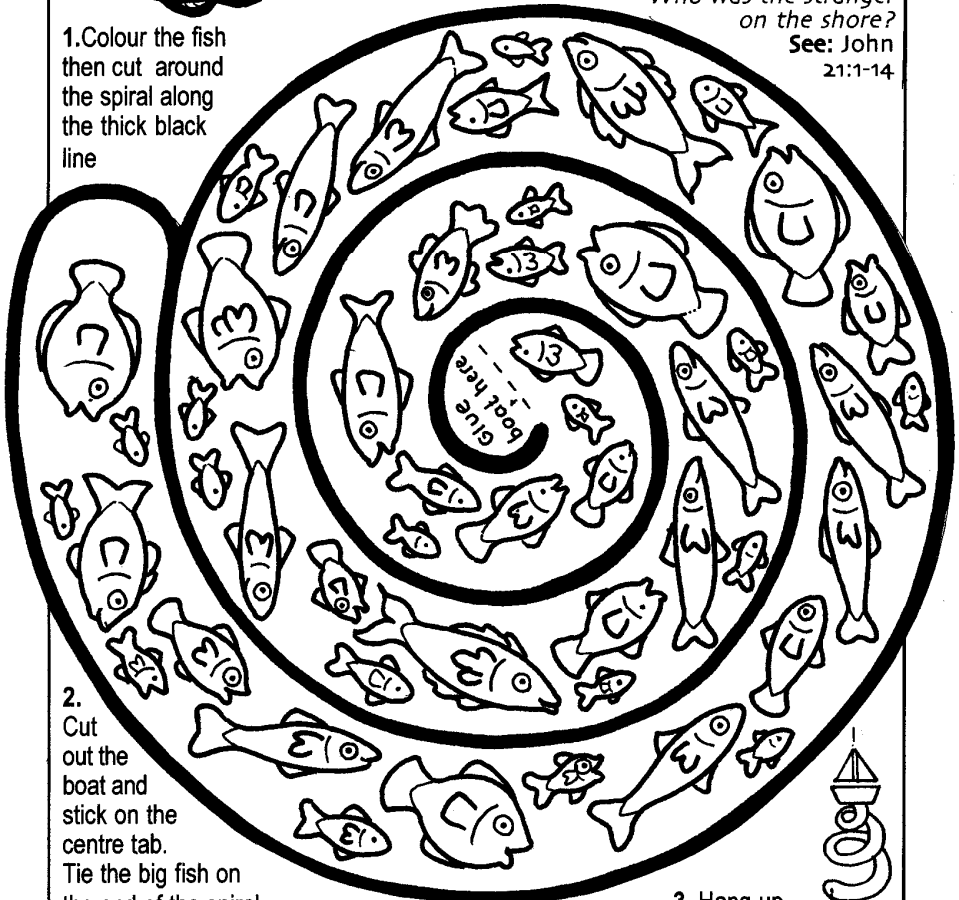


1. Colour the fish then cut around the spiral along the thick black line

and under heaven.



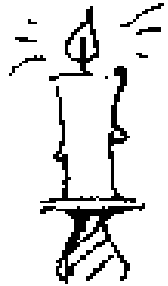

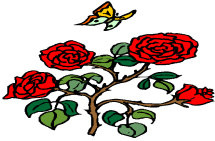

## June 9<sup>th</sup> - Columba of Iona (c. 521 -97)

Columba was born in Donegal of the royal Ui Neill clan, and trained as a monk. He founded the monasteries of Derry (546), Durrow (c.556) and probably Kells. But in 565 Columba left Ireland with twelve companions for Iona, an island off southwest Scotland. Iona had been given to him for a monastery by the ruler of the Irish Dalriada.

Why would a monk in his mid 40s go into such voluntary exile? Various explanations include: voluntary exile for Christ, an attempt to help overseas compatriots in their struggle for survival, or even as some sort of punishment for his part in a row over a psalter in Ireland. Whatever the reason, Columba went to Iona and spent the rest of his life in Scotland, returning to Ireland only for occasional visits.

Columba's biographer, Adomnan, portrays him as a tall, striking figure of powerful build and impressive presence, who combined the skills of scholar, poet and ruler with a fearless commitment to God's cause. Able, ardent, and sometimes harsh, Columba seems to have mellowed with age.

As well as building his monastery on Iona, Columba also converted Brude, king of the Picts. Columba had great skill as a scribe, and an example of this can be seen in the Cathach of Columba, a late 6th century psalter in the Irish Academy, which is the oldest surviving example of Irish majuscule writing. In his later years Columba spent much time transcribing books.

Columba's death was apparently foreseen by his community, and even, it seems, sensed by his favourite horse. He died in the church just before Matins, and it is a tribute to this man that his traditions were upheld by his followers for about a century, not least in the Synod of Whitby and in Irish monasteries on the continent of Europe.

Here is a prayer of St Columba:

**Christ With Us**  
My dearest Lord,  
Be Thou a bright flame before me,  
Be Thou a guiding star above me,  
Be Thou a smooth path beneath me,  
Be Thou a kindly shepherd behind me,  
Today and evermore.

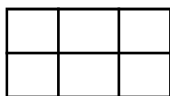
