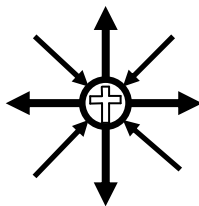
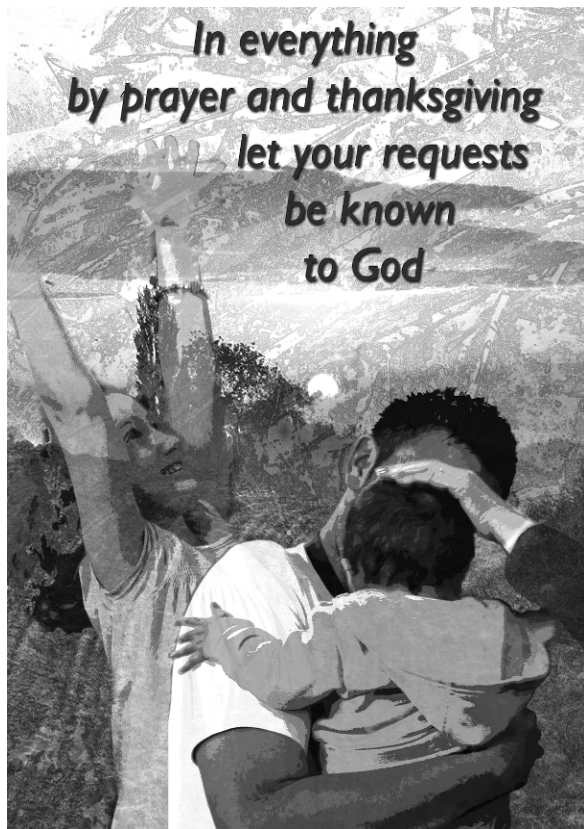

From the Vicar

Dear Readers,

Well, the school holidays didn't seem to last very long, did they? Or perhaps, if you've got very young children, it felt as though they dragged on and on, and on ...

Last time I talked about the work I do with SACRE. I thought this month I would take a bit of time to tell you about some of the work with the St. Augustine's Centre. The Centre has been going a long time (over 30 years now), and began as part of St. Augustine's Church, and has maintained those links over all that time.

Over those years it has undergone some changes as the area and people it serves have changed. That ability to respond to the needs of those it seeks to serve has been and continues to be one of its strengths. It began life providing help and support largely for single parents. This led eventually to the provision of a nursery, which still runs very successfully today.

As the population of the surrounding area changed, so the needs changed, and there was a great need especially for English classes for people who's first language wasn't English.

Then about 10 years ago the first asylum seeker walked through the doors. Very soon, many more were coming for basic help: help with filling in forms, with understanding correspondence from the Home Office, with finding a solicitor, or somewhere to live, and so on.

Very quickly, the numbers coming meant that there were always people coming and the idea developed that we would have a lunch for everyone on Tuesdays, and everyone would be dealt with then.

The lunch on Tuesday is still going strong (and anyone and everyone is welcome – come along and experience the wonderful chaos that is St. Augustine's first hand!) but the idea that we could deal with everyone on one day soon floundered with the sheer numbers of people needing help.

There are now several different sessions each week, from basic faxing facilities and help with filling in forms, to IT use (often the only way to keep

in touch with family members far away in other countries).

From help with housing, to help with immigration and people's asylum claims.

In the midst of all this is the need to keep the needs of individuals foremost. St. Augustine's does not exist to meet government or local authority targets but the needs of the people on our doorstep.

This means that there is certainly no such thing as a typical week at the Centre! We might be celebrating with someone who has just received their status in this country after waiting 8 years one minute (and we have some people still waiting after 10 years of fighting a system that seems geared to disbelieving people), and weeping with someone who has just heard that the Home Office have appealed (for no apparently good reason, and at great expense to the taxpayer) against the court's decision to give them status.

We might need to find someone something to cook on because they have just been moved to accommodation that has literally nothing in it, or we might be listening to a story of how they escaped a terrible situation in their own country, and their heartache at not knowing what has happened to the rest of their family.

Many of the groups that meet at the Centre involve 'doing' something together – gardening, cooking, sewing, and most recently making scarecrows for our festival. But beneath these activities, the real work of the Centre is making friends.

Jesus said, "This is who people will know you are my disciples – by the love you have for one another" (John 13.35).

This is the basic work of the Gospel – and it's a work that everyone can be involved in! That might be through volunteering at the Centre (come along and find out what the needs might be and how you might be able to help!) but it could also be where you are now – by having a chat with your neighbour, by doing the shopping of someone who is housebound, by listening to that person who sometimes gets on your nerves, by ... well, maybe God is already prompting you about what you might be able to do?

The Great Trinity Debate

Rob Bowman vs Dave Burke

Now this is eternal life — that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you sent. (John 17:3)

It is a matter of eternal life to know the true God and his son, the Lord Jesus Christ. It is our responsibility to understand the one true God. But do we really know him? Or do we just believe in a God that we've learned about from others? The identity of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit is a fundamental belief in Christianity and increasingly Christians don't know why they believe in what they do, unable to defend the doctrine of the Trinity when challenged. There seems to be a kind of complacency that comes from being a mainstream Christian, thinking that being in the majority is enough to make the doctrine true without needing proof. The Bereans searched their scriptures daily to make sure what they heard was true and that's no different with the doctrine of the Trinity, we have to search our scriptures to decide if it's true or not, not take it for granted or rely on someone else to tell us that it is or isn't true.

The debate about the Trinity has been raging on since the early church and it still rages on today. Rob Bowman, a Trinitarian issued a challenge last year for a non-Trinitarian to debate him on the subject of the Trinity. This year, Dave Burke a non-Trinitarian, took up that challenge and presented his case for the unity of God. A fascinating debate resulted and was captured on the Parchment and Pen blog. I recommend you read both sides of the argument thoroughly, it's not all as black and white as you might think as both sides have strong arguments.

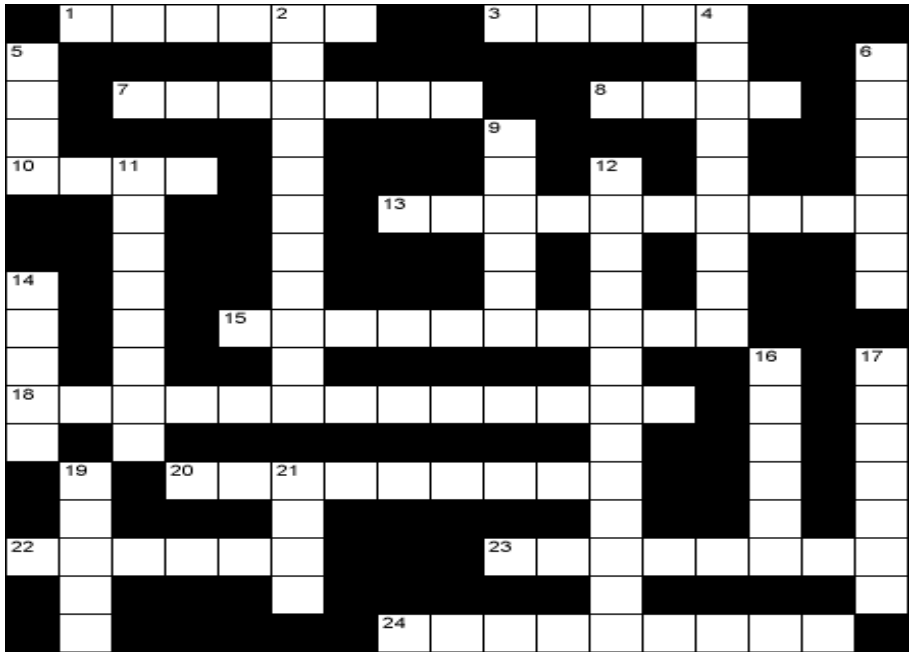
