Study the new Graduate Diploma in Youth Work at Sheffield Hallam University

Train for

- youth work
- voluntary sector work
- community work
- learning mentoring
- Connexions PA
- young person's health work
- sports development work
- youth offending team

You could travel on the fast track route and get qualified in one year (full-time) or two years (part-time). You gain 140 credits at level 6 (the third year of a degree).

You will need to have a relevant first degree (or equivalent) plus one year's full-time experience in youth work (or equivalent). We welcome applications from mature students and people from all sectors of the community.

You study six modules (20/30 credits each). You study two of these in your workplace. All your studies directly relate to your work as a practitioner. You must do 360 hours in the work place, known as professional practice, with 13-19 year olds.

Modules cover understanding youth work, contemporary issues, management, leadership and communication/intervention with young people.



If you choose to study full-time you attend University two days a week, plus work-based learning and your assignments. If you choose part-time, you attend one day a week and normally use your current work base as your placement in the first instance.

Both full-time and part-time students are normally taught together, with whole group sizes of only around 22 so you'll get lots of support.

Course fees have been set at £1,500 for full-time students or £750 for part-time students each year.

The course is based at City Campus, three minutes walk from the train station, and is taught on Mondays and Tuesdays. If you are part-time you come in on a Monday in the first year and Tuesday in the second year.

The course is validated by the National Youth Agency.
