Why are we focussing on these?

The first outcome is mandatory. The second outcome has a number of associated indicators and these relate to the agreed LSP health inequality priorities

How will we measure progress?

All indicators agreed to date have an established data collection process. These will need improving however these improvements are readily achievable.

Where can we stretch performance?

Smoking quitters (current target of 1100 per year) stretch in absolute numbers and reduce inequality

Breastfeeding maintenance (no existing target) rate of breastfeeding seems constant therefore target will be a stretch

Have we identified any enabling measures?

Not as yet

How can we use budgets better?

A focus on performance and realigning activity in these areas will ensure effective budget usage
