They met at the Food and Support Drop In and heard of how that project gives away over 100 food parcels each week and how many of the people helped have received practical and spiritual help with many of them becoming Christians with the results of freedom from addictions and bad lifestyle choices. The visitors then heard from CICS and of the work carried out in High Schools across Calderdale. Paul then talked about Street Angels and made mention to many of the other church based projects including Crisis Pregnancy Centre, St Augustine's Centre, Healing Rooms and Christians Against Poverty. Commenting afterwards one of the group said Street Angels would be needed in many of Germany's larger cities...

A meeting to look at the possibility of a **ROC Café** for Calderdale was well attended. ROC Café is a multi-agency approach to youth work and representatives from attended the meeting. The idea of a mobile ROC Café was suggested to help reach out to young people in areas where there is no existing youth provision. The next meeting is planned for Monday 16th May, 4pm at Holy Nativity Mixenden.

It is now a year since **Street Angels - Christian Nightlife Initiatives** became an independent charity. We have achieved much over this time including: fantastic volunteers out on the streets helping others every Friday and Saturday; organising of several major events including Big Response, Christian Resource Exhibition and AV Referendum; started to look at ideas such as ROC Café and an Education Pack; taken on HOPE Calderdale and become a central point for information sharing amongst the Borough's churches. Nationally we have: made and improved links with national Church, Police and Government networks; began to work alongside the Big Society agenda; widened the work of CNI to include and link with any activity working within the nighttime (5pm - 6am) economy; become a lead agency on initiatives such as More Than Gold; formed a Regional Coordinators group; seen over 30 new projects set up with more in the pipeline; began to meet and visit local projects; and launched Love Your Streets. All of this has been carried out with limited finances and two staff (both putting in around 60 hours per week on a part time salary)! We are now inviting people to stand with us financially by becoming Supporter Members and also inviting you to our **AGM** event on Tuesday 28th June, 7pm for refreshments, 7.15pm AGM...

CNI along with Faithworks and Charities Parliament hosted Debating Democracy events in Halifax and Bedford around the Alternative Voting Referendum which is taking place on May 5th.



In Halifax the chair was Dave Gilpin - pastor of Hope City Church (with congregations in seven cities) author, radio and tv presenter. The panel was made up of: Linda Riordan MP for Halifax; Bishop Colin Buchanan, former Bishop of Woolwich and Honorary Assistant Bishop of Bradford; Rev. Canon Dr. Jonathan Draper, Canon Theologian of York Minster; and James Baker of the Yes to AV campaign.

After a short video (available on the CNI web site) Dave offered an overview of Alternative Voting speaking from his experience in Australia and of the compulsory voting system. Dave presented quotes from both Yes and No sides and then handed over to the panel guests to share their views and thoughts.



The evening was then opened to debate and questions from the audience members resulting in lively and passionate conversation. At the close the challenge was given to those present to carry on the conversation and to raise the issue in forums until the day of the vote on 5th May.

In Bedford over 200 people gathered to hear from the Mayoral Candidates, leaders of the main Political parties and the chair Professor Mary Malcolm - Deputy Vice Chancellor University of Bedfordshire. A wide range of issues were discussed and some lively debates were had.

After “speed dating prayer” Paul and Adam shared

what CNI had achieved in the last 12 months including: links with church, politics, Big Society and various organisations; several new projects launching; and Love Your Streets.

We then looked at how CNI nationally can support the individual projects and regional gatherings better. It was agreed that funding needs to be sought to employ Paul and Adam full time to help develop the work of CNI nationally.

The group also looked at where CNI is heading. It was said that there needs to be more clarity between CNI and Street Angels with the aim to set up a separate CNI charity and structure. Ideas such as ROC Café, More Than Gold Olympics volunteering opportunities, training packages, development of an education pack and CNI Sunday pack, production of a video showing the national work and better marketing of CNI were all discussed and supported. We are also looking at sourcing flip-flops to offer to projects with www.wehelpedu.org.uk (which includes online giving) printed on them.

The two days together were a great opportunity to meet, pray and plan - the future of CNI is looking exciting!

Norfolk Street Pastors has joined the Christian Nightlife Initiatives Network to help it continue to develop its vital work on the night-time streets of Norfolk's urban areas.

Since the Norfolk Christian charity was formed in 2007, it has been part of London-based Ascension Trust umbrella organisation for many Street Pastors groups. Over those four years, the Norfolk charity has greatly developed its work in places such as Norwich city centre and suburbs, Dereham, Diss and Great Yarmouth.

To maintain the current work, and take it on to its next stage of development, the charity's trustees now feel that joining the Christian Nightlife Initiatives Network would be beneficial.

Chairman Richard Pennington said: "The CNI is a much more loose-knit structure than Ascension Trust, which nevertheless is very helpful in networking, sharing ideas and receiving useful advice on, for example, policies and procedures.



"Our ministry in Norfolk is significantly different from that in London and from our perspective, what may work extremely well in a metropolitan borough doesn't transfer to a largely rural county. To comply with the more recent Ascension Trust requirements would significantly reduce the effectiveness of our work.



"In practical terms, this should make no difference to the wonderful work that our paid staff and volunteers do in town and city centres across Norfolk."

Paul (who met with Steve, Paul and Rachael from Norfolk Street Pastors in April) and Adam add a welcome - "We are delighted to welcome Norfolk Street Pastors as a new member of CNI, as we seek to be a national voice for work being done in the night time economy. As a charity, we support the work that the Ascension Trust does recognising that this is one of many models that Christians can use. We would want to reinforce the value that CNI is not about a taking over, but rather creating a collective voice. There is a strong invitation for any Street Pastor project to maintain its roots with the Ascension Trust and become a part of CNI."

Adam attended the **Church Urban Fund** annual conference in London. The keynote speaker in the morning was Lord Nat Wei who was sharing his thoughts on creating communities of transformations. Lord Wei suggested Big Society is not, and never was, a programme for cuts and maintained that strong service delivery was the key to playing an active role.

This year more than ever we seem to have witnessed countless news reports about young people losing their lives in our rivers and waterways. This is not something new, it has been happening for many years, but the frequency at which it is happening is something of a concern.

A large group of people, some of whom have lost a loved one to drowning themselves, decided that we needed to take action and raise awareness about Water Safety through education and guidance. The **Waterway Safety Campaign** was created as a group on Facebook to begin with and has slowly evolved - www.facebook.com/WaterwaySafetyCampaign - anyone can join our campaign just by visiting our Facebook page.

We are all aware of our Governments attempts to curb “binge drinking” and the regular advertisements aimed at combating drinking and driving. Alcohol related drowning is an issue that has never been approached on a national scale. Our primary aim is to organise a Drink Awareness Campaign that incorporates basic water safety alongside all of these.

Many towns and cities have a river, canal or major body of water near by popular areas for drinkers. Major concerns are the newly developed urbanised areas along our waterways featuring a higher number of pubs, bars and other drinking establishments.

It seems to be a reoccurring scenario that a person may become separated from their friends after a night out and decide to walk alongside the waterway as a short cut or path home. The consumption of alcohol obviously greatly increases the risk of falling into the water. The more shocking discovery shown from statistics is that this is almost predominantly MALE. It is a natural instinct to take care of our female friends on a night out but it is the general belief that men can take care of themselves. This is obviously not true. It is important to stay together. Don't walk home alone. Always make sure you have money for a taxi/train/bus.

With the Summer months approaching the risks are increasing. We want to make this information available to everyone in the hope that we can help to save lives.



On Saturday 11th June Central London will host **Pentecost Festival** with a varied programme of events from comedy, sport, prayer, children's entertainment, fashion, debate, movies, food, music, colour, campaigning, social action, physical theatre, story telling, clubbing, ecology and more!

2nd June 2011 is designated as a **National Day of Prayer for the Police**. As key partners in much of the work locally and nationally it is important we pray regularly for our Police and the work they carry out. Some pointers for prayer are:

- That senior officers may have wisdom to direct their Forces well and have concern for all their staff
- That local Forces would be effective in administering justice, supporting victims, preventing and detecting crime, reducing the fear associated with it and building public confidence
- That officers will be kept safe and will enforce the law with integrity and wisdom especially in volatile situations
- That officers and their families would be protected from the effects of stress and know God's peace in their lives
- That Christian police officers and support staff will be strong and effective in their witness within the Police Service
- That God would transform and renew the lives of individuals and communities caught up in addiction, despair, crime and disorder
- That the Church would respond to local issues and help bring communities together with the police to tackle local problems effectively

Your Police Service needs Christians to support them in their work. Please consider linking with local Christian officers and staff to develop prayer networks and support community projects. It has been suggested in the past that people find out the names of their local Community Policing Team and commit to praying for them. Please do encourage people to pray for and support the Police - for more info see www.coact.org.uk
