Dear Friends,

Minister's Letter

In any card shop at this time of year the predominant colour is red or pink, and the predominant motif the heart. Yes, in February comes (St) Valentine's day, that annual festival of romantic love. There was originally some association between the day and one or more Christian saints called Valentine, but that connection is tenuous at most, and since at least Chaucer's day February 14 has been the day of love. And why ever not? Most people want to love and to be loved. I'm all for romance. Let's celebrate something the government can't cut!

As the day causes us to reflect on human love, I wonder if it will also cause us to reflect on God's love. As we send messages of affection to our loved ones, might we not also think of the ones we continue to receive from our great Lover? Valentine's cards have all sorts of messages in them, from the trite to the lewd. God's declarations of love are never less than profound. Throughout the Bible God shows himself to be the great lover of his people, like this, for example, in Isaiah: "I am the Lord who created you; from the time you were born, I have helped you. Do not be afraid; you are my servant, my chosen people whom I love." Or this: "'The mountains and hills may crumble, but my love for you will never end; I will keep for ever my promise of peace.' So says the LORD who loves you." It's heady stuff, and all from a time before the fullness of God's love was shown to us in Jesus.

One of Jesus' early followers, John, was later to write this: "This is how we know what love is: Christ gave his life for us. We too, then, ought to give our lives for others!" True love shows itself not in the messages of greetings cards, or romantic dinners, but in action. True love means working for the best interests of the one you love. It's how God loves us. If we are to love God in return it has to mean that we dedicate our lives to things that are in God's best interests. I wonder what those might be...

Christian Days - 2nd February

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple / Candlemas



In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2 February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to "present him to the Lord". At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas. The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40.

February 14th - A St Valentine's Day Legend

There are two confusing things about this day: firstly, there seems to have been two different Valentines in the 4th century - one a priest martyred on the Flaminian Way, under the emperor Claudius, the other a bishop of Terni martyred at Rome. And neither seems to have had any clear connection with lovers. Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage. A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for the couples who wanted to marry, but couldn't, so he secretly married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison waiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14 February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.' So the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.

New courses starting soon at Illingworth Moor Church

New to this area is a course on **How to Use Your Mobile Phone** (you must have a mobile phone to bring with you). Classes will run on Wednesdays, 9th, 16th and 23rd March from 1 to 3 pm and will be taken by Chris Helme.

There is a maximum number of 12 people for this class so booking is on a first come first served basis.

There will be an evening Food Hygiene course commencing on Tuesday, 15th March. More details of the time later.

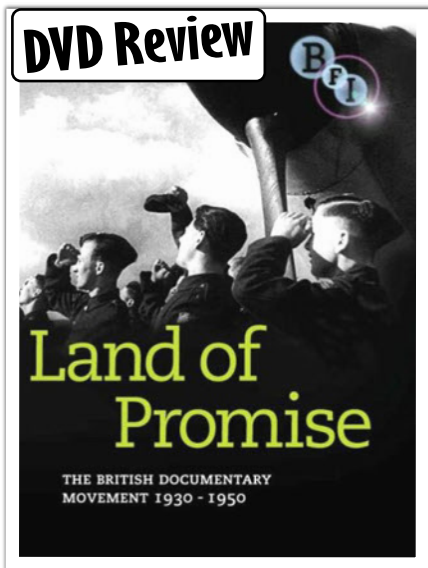

Land of Promise - The British Documentary Movement 1930 - 1950

Whilst reading a review of recently released DVD's, I came across one that really caught my attention, entitled the Land of Promise.

The Land of Promise is a 4-disc DVD set, with 13 hours of re-mastered film footage, which contains the most incredible selection of films - over 40 in total - of ordinary life in Britain between 1930 and 1950.

For those of you who have an interest in social history, this box-set is a must. That said, I am convinced that anyone who gets a chance to watch this box-set will be captivated by many of the films and documentaries.

Presented chronologically, the films cover a broad range of

social and industrial topics: problems faced by the working class; education and schools; industrialisation and skills; and practical advice for Britons during the Second World War.

Here are just a few of the films on the DVD's: **Workers and Jobs, Children at School, Housing Problems, If War Should Come, Transport, Ordinary People, Summer on the Farm, What a Life and The Countrywomen.**

Whilst watching some of the films I noticed my children had begun to take an interest in some of the documentaries, especially the ones that focused on school life in the 1930's. They were absolutely amazed to see teachers putting their pupils to bed for an afternoon sleep! It was also an eye-opener for them to see the living conditions of so many ordinary Britons during the 1930's. Nowadays many of our children couldn't possibly imagine life without the latest computer game or MP3 player.

For those of you reading this and wanting to get hold of a copy, I would recommend taking a look online. Prices do vary but you should be able to buy one for no more than £25. Indeed, if you have a look on some of the online auction sites you may very well pick up a copy for a lot less. Whatever you pay, it will be a bargain price to view a window into our past.

Neighbourhood Learning in Deprived Communities (NLDC)

At Illingworth Moor Methodist Church, in the months before Christmas 2010 we were running classes which would help people in their work situation or for those not working to gain some qualification for them to put down on their application form when seeking employment.

We ran a Food Hygiene course at Levels 1 and 2 and at the end of five weeks studying for 14 hours, eight people received their certificates.

Likewise we ran an Emergency First Aid course which involved two sessions of three hours study and in the first instance there were 24 names on the list.



In the end 19 people completed the course and were rewarded with certificates.

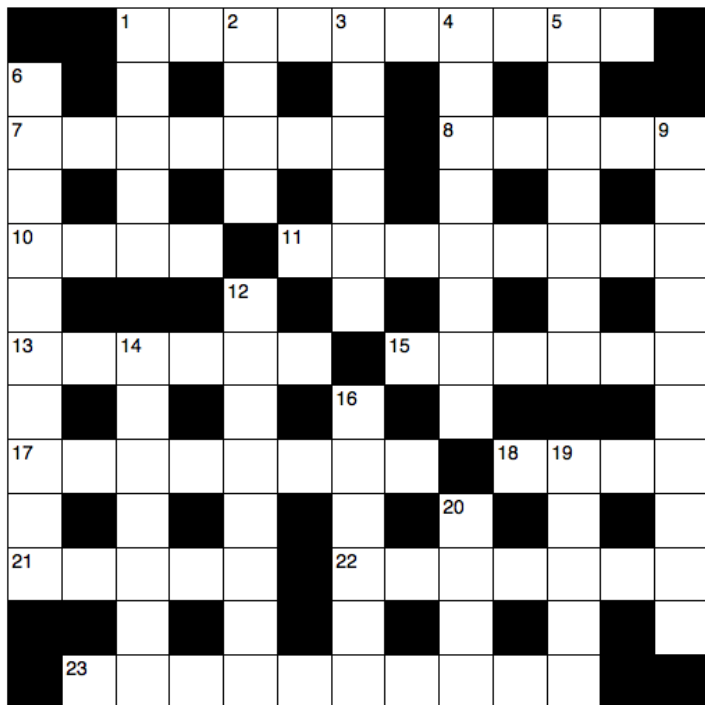
We had 15 people enrolled on the IT Beginners course which ran for five weeks, two hours each week.

The least well attended course was the Maths and English Workshop but those who did attend for the five weekly two hour classes gained enormously from their efforts. This class was for any age group but was for those who had not done particularly well at school, for whatever reason, but who were now trying to improve their reading, writing and maths skills.

There will definitely be more classes starting in the first week in March and they will run right to the summer. **See the centre pages for more details on these courses.**

These courses are completely free and are open to everyone in the north of Halifax. Please do take advantage of this fantastic opportunity.
